

BETA-TESTING REACHING CALM: EXPLORING DIGITAL APPROACHES TO ADDRESS SUICIDE RISK IN OBSTETRIC SETTINGS


Reaching Calm is a multicomponent digital intervention to prevent perinatal anxiety disorders in obstetric settings. Reaching Calm includes a 1) digital Anxiety Sensitivity Intervention, 2) obstetric professional training, and 3) implementation protocol to integrate anxiety prevention into the obstetric workflow. In this pilot project, we will adapt Reaching Calm to address suicide risk by using a community-engaged, user-centered design approach to integrate a Computerized Adaptive Test (CAT) into the digital intervention. We will then beta-test Reaching Calm in an obstetric clinic with 30 perinatal patients. We will use surveys, interviews, and focus groups to explore the acceptability and feasibility of remote suicide risk assessment and intervention with patients and obstetric professionals.

ASSIST: ADVANCING STUDENT SUICIDE INTERVENTIONS WITH SCALABLE TECHNOLOGIES


Mobile interventions like Jaspr increase access to evidence-informed suicide care, yet there are barriers to college students' use of digital health technologies. We aim to integrate the Jaspr intervention in college settings using a Hybrid Type I Effectiveness-Implementation design, using human-in-the-loop augmentations (e.g., motivational interviewing principles, personalization, and personal light-touch follow-ups) to improve user experience and engagement (Jaspr+).

First, we will explore barriers and facilitators of adoption of Jaspr+ in college contexts by interviewing college healthcare staff, administrators, and students with histories of suicidal thoughts and/or behaviors. Next, we will compare Jaspr vs. Jaspr+ in a randomized controlled trial of 50 students. Lastly, we will assess the overall effectiveness of Jaspr across conditions on preliminary effectiveness outcomes and potential mechanisms (coping skills, selfstigma).


ESTABLISHED SCHOLAR



BENJAMIN NEPHEW, PHD Dr. Nephew's current focus is on applying machine learning with an array of biopsychosocial data from a clinical trial to predict the response to a mindfulness intervention for chronic low back pain. He is also involved in a project using machine learning to predict anxiety, depression, and suicidality in middle and high school students, and an associated initiative is exploring the impact of social media on youth mental health.

Dr. Nephew works with Dean Jean King at Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI). Their program of research is focused on identifying and studying neurobehavioral mechanisms of mental illness and developing effective interventions. Recent projects include using functional MRI (fMRI) to identify the neural correlates of mindfulness-based stress reduction as part of a stage lla randomized clinical trial, and using fMRI data combined with related clinical measures to develop machine learning based early predictors of severe depression and suicidality. He developed a transgenerational social stress based rodent model of postpartum depression/anxiety, and related clinical work explores the role of behavioral hormones, discrimination, and epigenetic changes in postpartum depression/anxiety.



RICHARD LOPEZ, PHD


Dr. Lopez is a social neuroscientist and Assistant Professor of Psychology and Neuroscience at Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI). He investigates the psychological and neural mechanisms underlying emotion regulation to improve health and wellbeing in daily life. His Social Neuroscience of Affective Processes (SNAP) Lab at WPI develops personalized, psychologically informed interventions aimed at improving young people's mental health. Recently, the SNAP Lab has identified psychological factors linked to social media use that could be targeted in interventions to reduce anxiety and depression. As a CAPES scholar, Dr. Lopez is eager to expand his research program, collaborating with clinicians to enhance understanding of suicide prediction and prevention, with a particular focus on early, technology-based intervention strategies.

KATHRYN SABELLA, PHD

Dr. Sabella is an Assistant Professor at UMass Chan Medical School in the Department of Psychiatry and Deputy Director of the Implementation Science and Practice Advances Research Center (iSPARC) and Director of the Transitions to Adulthood Center for Research. She is one of only a few national scholars in young adult mental health and has emerged as one of the leading experts in the field. Her research employs gualitative and guantitative methods and community based participatory methods to a) create new knowledge about the needs and experiences of young adults with serious mental health conditions, and b) apply that knowledge to the development, testing, and implementation of age-appropriate and culturally appealing evidence-based practices that can improve the lives of these young adults. She is Co-PI of the Center for Community Inclusion and Reflective Collaboration that seeks to improve community participation outcomes among young adults with mental health conditions from backgrounds that have been marginalized (NIDILRR/ACL/HHS# 90RTCP0010).



XIHAN YANG, PHD

Dr. Yang is as a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Family Resilience and Child Development (FRCD) lab at the iSPARC, working under Dr. Shaobing Su. Her research focuses on intersectional effects of neurodiversity and cultural diversity. As someone without much prior information on CAPES, the Executive Summary was helpful and informative. Susan Stefan was a great starter and a great speaker. Her presentation was really moving and I felt like she really had an important message. The section on person-centered operational improvement was very informative and interesting to listen to.

Excellent set of interdisciplinary and high-impact talks. I appreciated the focus on real-world effectiveness and the speakers' transparency about challenges they have had when conducting their studies and/or implementing policy changes. Lots of resources were provided on where to find help for yourself and others. CAPES website is extremely well set up and easy to navigate to find the information you need.

JASPR AND CREID: JASPR's integration of personalized support for individuals in crisis, combined with evidence-based practices, is truly groundbreaking. I also found the CREID framework's combination of RCTs and realworld studies to be a powerful approach in developing generalizable suicide prevention strategies that will have a broader real-world impact.

LEVERAGING ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) FOR SUICIDE PREVENTION

In December 2024, CAPES MLU hosted a virtual webinar titled "Leveraging Artificial Intelligence (AI) for Suicide Prevention: A Multi-Faceted Approach to Mental Health Support." Led by Prashanth Brahmandam from Backpack Healthcare, the session explored the transformative role of AI and data analytics in suicide prevention efforts.

The presentation highlighted the potential of Al-driven insights to detect at-risk individuals, optimize timely interventions, and strengthen care coordination. Key topics included the integration of diverse data sources—such as behavioral patterns, language indicators, and clinical histories—along with discussions on system integration, data privacy, security concerns, and risk mitigation strategies.



This training contributed to CAPES' ongoing mission to enhance suicide prevention practices through innovative, data-driven solutions, equipping stakeholders with critical knowledge on leveraging AI for mental health support.

PDU SPONSORED EVENT: WHAT INSIGHTS DO EHR AUDIT LOGS HOLD? ADVANCING USABILITY AND CLINICIAN EMPOWERMENT



Dr. Saif Khairat is the Beerstecher-Blackwell Distinguished Professor at UNC-Chapel Hill, leading the NIHfunded Center for Virtual Care Value and Equity (ViVE). An expert in digital health, he has authored over 100 publications, secured \$7.5M in research grants, and advises the WHO on non-communicable diseases. Dr. Khairat holds a PhD in Health Informatics and degrees in Computer Science and Public Health.

Audit logs from electronic health records (EHRs) held untapped potential for understanding user behavior, system interactions, and workflow challenges in healthcare. This talk explored how audit logs could be harnessed to improve usability and optimize clinician workflows, drawing from recent studies on identifying bottlenecks, reducing cognitive load, and enhancing user experience. By leveraging audit log analytics, researchers moved beyond static usability evaluations to create adaptive systems that met the dynamic needs of healthcare providers. This presentation shared insights, methodologies, and findings from research, offering a roadmap for actionable improvements in EHR design and evaluation.

USER EXPERIENCE SYMPOSIUM 2024

On November 20th, 2024, the 6th Annual UX Symposium (UXSYM) was held at WPI in Worcester, MA and supported by Person Design Unit (PDU). The User Experience Symposium (UXSYM) 2024 provided a platform that allowed experts from industry and academia to come together to share their experiences and shape the future of UX research. That theme focused on harnessing the power of AI to create innovative and valuable user experiences. The event provided a unique opportunity to explore cuttingedge research and participate in discussions about the future of AI and UX with leading innovators in the field.



Dr. Bill Albert, Founder and Principal of Global UX Partners, delivered this year's keynote address. Known for his exceptional leadership in UX and product innovation, Dr. Albert presented "How Al and Other Emerging Technologies Help (and Hurt) UX Research and Product Innovation," which was one of the most insightful highlights of the symposium.

Dr. Zai is the Director of the Research Informatics Core (RIC) at UMass Chan Medical School, which develops and implements technology that address critical health care challenges. The RIC leads many initiatives that leverage informatics and artificial intelligence to improve research, care delivery, and operational efficiency. The RIC also develops implementing technologies that address critical healthcare challenges beyond the immediate CAPES project.

Our Lived Experience Advisory Board includes five people who all have personal lived experience with suicidal thoughts and/or attempts and with the healthcare system, as well as two co-facilitators, Rick Strait of Education Development Center and Lourah Kelly, of UMass Chan Medical School. As a person who has lived with ideation as long as I can remember, it's so good to see the work being done to simply humanize my issues and the care provided to me in a time of crisis. Today I listened to a room of doctors, psychologists, lawyers, and programmers talk passionately about the broken system that just pushes suicidal patients through the incident and back out the door, and what they need to do and are trying to do not only to help us get through the crisis, but through our lives as people who have these intrusive thoughts and have to deal with them regularly. Until today, I'd only really seen a sliver of what CAPES was doing, but today I'm blown away by the compassion flowing through that room. This is academia as it should be."


Get to Know




